

T WAYS TO MAKE THE MOST OF CAMPUS VISITS

Once you have a short list of schools that you think you'd really like, the next best thing you can do is visit each. Seeing a campus in person is the easiest way to get a sense of what it's like to be a student there and have all those things you read about online finally come to life. HERE'S HOW TO MAKE THE MOST OF YOUR INITIAL VISITS.

BRING A LIST OF OPEN-ENDED QUESTIONS.



Now is the time to ask anything websites can't

answer, including questions only your tour guide can answer... like why he or she chose that school, where students really go on weekends and how safe they feel on campus. Bonus tip: Ask your guide, "What's the most surprising question you've ever heard, and how'd you respond?" You just may uncover an interesting tidbit you didn't know to research.



SEE WHAT YOU NEED TO SEE, AND THEN SOME.



Chances are you'll have only a few hours to explore,

so again, preparing a list is key. Look for things that will affect your life there: Planning to live on campus? Pop into a residence hall. Want to study chemistry? Check out the lab. Then add to that list these observation ideas: how well-kept the grounds are, how modern the facilities look and if you see construction (that's a good sign that the school has the funds and desire to make improvements).



SNAP PHOTOS.



Have your phone ready as you walk the campus.

Whenever you see something you really like, take a picture—it'll help you recreate the day once you're back home.



GET OFF CAMPUS.



Find out what's within walking distance from

the college—eateries, shops, parks—and how easy it is to travel around town. They say they have Zipcars or bus access nearby? See for yourself, especially if you'll be traveling home every now and then.



CHAT WITH OTHERS.



Before you go, ask Admissions if they can arrange brief meetings for

you with a professor or current student. And don't be afraid to talk with other prospective students. Share notes, and see if their pros/cons align with yours.



TAKE A BREAK.



Spend a few minutes in the library and eat in

the dining hall. Since that's where you'll be spending a lot of your time, take a seat, look around and ask yourself: *Do I feel at home here?*



COLLECT SOME SOUVENIRS.



By that, we mean campus publications,

local newspapers, admissions materials and maybe even menus from local food establishments (why not!) — anything that will help you paint a picture of your life there.

HOW MANY TIMES SHOULD YOU VISIT?

As many times as you can and want to! Especially once you've narrowed down your list to just a few favorites. And after you've been admitted, go again — accepted student visits are the best ones. No pressure, all celebratory.

TIPS TO STRENGTHEN YOUR APPLICATION



When you're ready to tackle apps, prioritize these five tips. Our admissions team feels strongly about each and every one.



Ask early, and ask the right people—those who you know will give you a rave review. To ensure that the letters are top-notch, provide each person with information you hope they'll touch on—and gently remind them as deadlines approach.



PROOFREAD. THEN ASK OTHERS TO PROOFREAD TOO.

A typo won't make or break you, but we do pick up on it when there are multiple grammar mistakes, incomplete thoughts, and spelling errors. Send us your most polished work. (And on that note: If the essay is optional, do it!)



MENTION THAT YOU'VE VISITED.

Remember that visit, and that revisit? Admissions committees love to hear that you stopped by. It displays interest and shows them you know you'll be happy there.



ASK FOR FEEDBACK.

As soon as you've finished one application, hand it over

to a fresh set of eyes—a couple of people you trust—to look it over. They can check to see if you completed all sections and that you sound like yourself in the essay.



TRUST YOUR SCHOOL COUNSELOR.

He or she can tell you which parts of your application need improvement and how to make them better. WHEN YOU GET THE OPPORTUNITY TO MEET AN ADMISSIONS COUNSELOR, PROFESSOR, OR GRADUATE FACE-TO-FACE...

SAY YES; it's a great way to show your personality and express your interest in the school.

THINK OF ANY GLITCHES in your application that you'd like to explain in person, so they can make a note of it.

TELL YOUR STORIES, have fun and relax. Remember: the interviewer wants you to do well.

BUSINESS CARD, so you can thank them later.

HAVE DETAILED QUESTIONS READY TO ASK—which means research, research!

ATTEND COLLEGE FAIRS

(Admissions counselors look!)



PLAN OUT THE TESTS you'll need to take (like SAT or ACT), just in case. Siena is test-optional!



TALK ABOUT FINANCES with your parents and start researching scholarships
